

A Model of Inquiry: SSLA Fall Conference

Carol Koechlin is *trying* to retire. However, Carol and her long time colleague and collaborator Sandi Zwaan, are too much in demand to be fully retired. School districts and conference organizers contact Carol regularly to share her expertise in the areas of inquiry learning and the transformation of the school library into a *learning commons*. Never have the talents of qualified teacher librarians been needed more than now. Over one hundred and ten teacher librarians benefited from a workshop Carol lead on Monday, October 25 in Regina at the SSLA Fall Conference. In this workshop, Carol modeled the methodology she encourages others to use to foster inquiry. Participants engaged in activities to learn more about the process of inquiry and the concept the learning commons. The key inquiry questions for the day were:

How does the 21st century school library program support inquiry learning?

How do we

- meet the needs of learners today?
- help users be smart users of information?
- encourage positive mindsets?
- foster deep learning?
- be inclusive of all learners?

What is a learning commons and how can this approach enable successful inquiry learning?

Carol is enthusiastic about the renewal of the Saskatchewan curriculum, which encourages students to construct understanding of content and skills through inquiry. According to Carol, this renewal creates an open door for teacher librarians. Their knowledge and expertise is much needed by classroom teachers of all grades and subject areas as they struggle to understand and implement these changes. Carol had prepared engaging activities and selected thought provoking videos for the workshop. In the morning, participants worked together to expand their knowledge of today's learners and their needs. In the afternoon, the focus shifted to an exploration of the concept of a learning commons and its role in supporting successful inquiry.

According to Carol, the key to learning is approaching information or any task with questions. She involved the table groups in an entertaining exercise to discover how inquiry is like a ladder? Or like a menu? A river? A diary? A butterfly? Using an online Google spreadsheet participants were able to contribute simultaneously their ideas on a common topic. People were very enthusiastic about trying this technique in their own schools. In the teacher librarian spirit of sharing and collaboration, Carol created a wiki containing the materials she used in the workshop and has generously allowed it to be shared: http://sslalearningcommons.pbworks.com/.

Each participant received a copy of Carol and Sandi's latest publication, *Building Info Smarts: How to work with all kinds of information and make it your own*, and left the session with a wealth of fresh ideas and enthusiasm.
