If you think that Wolfram Alpha is somehow connected to the current interest in vampires and werewolves fueled by Stephanie Meyer's *Twilight* series, you are incorrect. Wolfram Alpha is a knowledge engine that collects and calculates a myriad of information in a user friendly manner. Almost like magic, with one click, it answers a simple English query and includes maps, charts, graphs, computations, pictures and a whole host of comparative data.

The Wolfram Alpha website (http://www.wolframalpha.com/) explains the long term goal of this project is "to make all systematic knowledge immediately computable and accessible to everyone". In order to do this, the project collects data, models, methods, and algorithms of all kinds. Using "free-form input", Wolfram Alpha can generate clear, powerful results covering vast ranges of knowledge. It attempts to provide comprehensible, useful answers to people regardless of their education or careers.
