

# **Canadian Author Month**

#### Saskatchewan School Library Association

November is Canadian Author Month. Using the study of our country's novelists and writers, students are encouraged to pack their bookbags to voyage across Canada to celebrate their favorite authors, including the Willow Award nominees.

#### Setting the Scene

Feature Canadian authors using creative displays. A comprehensive list of Canadian authors and illustrators can be found at the <u>Canadian Children's Book Centre's Web site</u>. Create an interesting bulletin board using book covers, Canadian maps, coins, and maple leaves for letters. Surround the bulletin board with posters depicting the nation's major landmarks, tourist attractions, currency, heroes, animals, and symbols.

Display books about Canada - geography books, travel guides, biographies of famous Canadians, arranged around the national and provincial flags. Add a camera, binoculars, maps, imitation passport, and perhaps a small suitcase or two. Set out a jigsaw puzzle of Canada with a few pieces assembled to entice kids to complete.

Spotlight the current Willow Award nominees (http://www.willowawards.ca/). Saskatchewan Young Readers' Choice - The Willow Awards promote reading by granting a Willow Award to the Canadian books voted by students to be the best of those nominated in three categories: Shining Willow (K-3), Diamond Willow (4-6) and Snow Willow (7-9).

#### **Reading Promotion**

Entice classrooms to participate by introducing the contest *The Canadian Challenge*. Broadcast a question related to a Canadian author in the morning announcement. Two sets of questions are appended; one set is designed for a primary and middle level audience and the second set is designed for the secondary level audience Students in each classroom work collaboratively to solve each question. Answers are recorded and submitted at the end of the theme. Classrooms with all the answers correct earn a prize and the title: *We Answered The Canadian Reader Challenge*.

Invite a Canadian author to visit the school. The Writer's Guild provides a list of Canadian authors and illustrators.

Host a student reading promotion focused on Canadian authors and illustrators for middle level and secondary students. Students track their reading and participation using the appended Canadian Reader Passport. To entice students to participate, discuss the requirements needed to be invited to the culminating gala. Readers obtain a stamp (Canadian flag sticker) in their passport at the completion of each reading task. The passport can be modified to accommodate different grade levels or individual needs.

**Canadian Reader's Travel Log:** Use the reproducible pattern to create a travel log. Print 8½ x 11" sheets on both sides, quarter fold, cut through the top fold to make eight-page booklets, and staple the left edge.

To obtain stamps, students must follow these steps:

- 1. Read at least one book, fiction or nonfiction, about Canada.
- 2. In the passport, write the title and author of the book.
- 3. Complete one of the choice of products.

#### **Celebrate Canada Party**

For each reader who has obtained the required level of passport stamps, distribute a ticket to the Celebrate Canada culminating party. Another option would be to have the readers play a game of Canada's favourite sport, hockey, against the teachers.

Regardless of the party format, ensure all readers who have read the required the minimum number of books required, vote for their favourite nominated Willow Award book. Individual ballots or class tallies of individual votes may be submitted. ## THE WILLOW AWARDS

The featured authors are Willow Award nominees – stories that celebrate Canada's contribution to literacy. The mission of The Willow Awards is to promote reading by granting a "Willow Award" to the Canadian and/or Saskatchewan book(s) voted by Saskatchewan students to be the best of those nominated in designated categories for a specific year.

In an effort to encourage participation by all children, regardless of the level at which they are reading, three awards have been established:

- The Shining Willow Award for books written for young readers.
- The Diamond Willow Award for titles written for upper elementary readers (grades 4-6).
- The Snow Willow Award for books for young people in grades 7 9.

Students may vote in any category in which they have read the minimum number of books required. Individual ballots or class tallies of individual votes may be submitted. Participation in the Willow Awards is free to Saskatchewan students.

The SYCRA Willows Web site (<a href="http://www.willowawards.ca/">http://www.willowawards.ca/</a>) provides sample booktalks for each of the nominated Willow award books.

#### **Primary Level Storytime**

To share the ten nominated Willow award nominees with younger readers, invite older students to be the guest readers. Place primary students in groups. Two older students should be part of each primary group. One older student holds the book with the illustrations facing the primary audience. The second older student reads the text. The primary students rotate to hear each of the stories.

To vote for their favourite Willow nominated book, create polling stations similar to an election. Behind each polling station, place a ballot for students to mark a X beside their choice. Ballots are available on the Willows Awards Web Site (<a href="http://www.willowawards.ca/ballots-and-forms">http://www.willowawards.ca/ballots-and-forms</a>) and contain screenshots of the book covers to help the younger readers identify their choice. Once primary students have made their choice, their ballot is placed in the secret box. Tally the results and submit to the Willow Awards using their Online Summary Form.

#### **Booktalks for the Middle and Secondary Novel**

Create dynamic booktalks using VoiceThread (<a href="http://voicethread.com/#home">http://voicethread.com/#home</a>). VoiceThread is a free tool for having asynchronous collected group conversations about the Willow nominated novels. Upload images related to the nominated novels and create a coordinating audio narrative.

Once a photo, video, graphic or document related to the novel is posted, students can comment using a computer microphone, telephone, text, audio file, and webcam. Encourage students to comment on the booktalk by responding to posed questions, documenting their connections, or inquiring about unanswered questions inspired by the novel.

- 6. Other Arrange with teacher-librarian

Students who obtain at least three stickers are invited to the culminating gala.
